Sharing the Kindness News

Lesson Summary

This lesson empowers students to become "Kindness Reporters" and share the wonderful things they have learned about helping. Building on previous lessons, students will recall key ideas about kindness, helping teams, and the "magical gift." They will then create their own "Kindness News" card to take home, giving them a fun and tangible tool to help them share these positive stories with their families in a gentle, child-led way.

Learning Intentions

Students will

- Remember the important ideas we have learned about being a helper.
- Understand that it feels good to share happy and kind news with others.
- Create a "Kindness News" card to help us share our stories with our families.

- Name one kind thing I have learned about in our lessons.
- Help make a "Kindness News" card to take home.
- Practise telling someone my "Kindness News.



Resources Required

- A "reporter's hat" or a toy microphone for the teacher to use as a prop.
- A large piece of paper for a class brainstorm, titled "Our Kindness News!"
- A pre-folded A4 card for each student (to be their "Kindness News" card).
- Crayons, markers, and stickers.
- A picture book about sharing stories or news (e.g., The Knight Who Wouldn't Fight by Helen Docherty).

Teacher Preparation

- Prepare the "Kindness News" brainstorm chart and the folded cards for students.
- The goal of this lesson is not to have children initiate a serious conversation about organ donation. It is to empower them to share the positive and magical stories of helping they have learned. This provides a gentle, child-led opening for families to talk further if they wish. The focus must remain on the fun of being a "reporter" sharing good news.

Additional Information

This lesson has been created as part of <u>Donate Buddies</u>, a program designed to help young children explore kindness, sharing, and the importance of helping others. By introducing these concepts in a fun, age-appropriate, and engaging way, children begin to understand the power of kindness and how their actions can make a big difference.

Organ, eye, and tissue donation is a real-life example of this kindness, where one person can help save the lives of many others. While most people can donate tissue, only a small number of people who pass away in hospitals can become organ donors.

One organ donor alone can save up to seven lives and help many more people through eye and tissue donation.
