# A Thank You for the Kindness

(Year 1 - Ages 6-7):

Lesson 7 of 9

#### Lesson Summary

This gentle and reflective lesson provides an opportunity for students to consolidate their learning and express gratitude for the entire "ripple of kindness" involved in donation. Students will discuss the importance of saying "thank you" and will recap the key figures and actions in the donation story. The main activity is creating a beautiful "Thank You" card, not for a specific person, but as a symbolic gesture of appreciation for everyone involved in this ultimate act of kindness.

## Learning Intentions

#### Students will .....

- Understand that saying "thank you" is an important way to show appreciation.
- Recall the different people and kind choices in the story of the gift of life.
- Express our feeling of gratitude through a creative card.

#### Success Criteria

#### Students can .....

- Explain that we say "thank you" when someone is kind.
- Name one part of the donation story that I am thankful for.
- Create a "Thank You for the Kindness" card to add to our class display.



### Resources Required

- A picture book about gratitude or saying thank you (e.g., An Awesome Book of Thanks! by Dallas Clayton).
- A large "Wall of Kindness" banner or display area in the classroom.
- A pre-folded A4 card for each student.
- A variety of special and colourful craft supplies (glitter, stickers, coloured paper shapes, etc.).
- Crayons and markers.

# Teacher Preparation

- Prepare the "Kindness Wall" display area.
- Have the folded cards and special craft supplies ready for the students.
- This lesson is a culminating activity for the core concepts. It's
  important to frame the "Thank You" card as a symbolic act. The
  students are not thanking one person, but rather the entire idea of
  kindness and all the people who are part of the donation story (the
  family who says yes, the doctors, etc.). This keeps the concept positive
  and abstract.

# Additional Information

This lesson has been created as part of <u>Donate Buddies</u>, a program designed to help young children explore kindness, sharing, and the importance of helping others. By introducing these concepts in a fun, age-appropriate, and engaging way, children begin to understand the power of kindness and how their actions can make a big difference.

Organ, eye, and tissue donation is a real-life example of this kindness, where one person can help save the lives of many others. While most people can donate tissue, only a small number of people who pass away in hospitals can become organ donors. One organ donor alone can save up to seven lives and help many more people through eye and tissue donation.
