Superhero Hall of Fame

(Year 3 - Ages 8-9):

Lesson 9 of 9

Lesson Summary

This final lesson is a grand celebration of the entire unit, culminating in the creation of a "Superhero Hall of Fame." Students will reflect on all the heroes and concepts they've learned, from the "Kindness Blueprint" to the "Hero Story." In a creative activity, each student will design a special award or plaque for their favourite Donate Buddy or heroic concept. The lesson concludes by honouring the act of organ and tissue donation as the ultimate entry into the Hall of Fame, celebrating it as the greatest act of heroism and kindness.

Learning Intentions

Students will

- Reflect on and consolidate their learning about kindness, the body, and helping others.
- Understand that all acts of kindness, big and small, are heroic and worthy of celebration.
- Celebrate organ donation as a profound act of heroism.

Success Criteria

Students can

- Share one important idea they have learned during the unit.
- Explain why their chosen hero or concept deserves to be in the "Hall of Fame."
- Create an award that celebrates an act of kindness or a Donate Buddy hero.



Resources Required

- A large "Superhero Hall of Fame" banner or poster.
- Work from previous lessons displayed around the room (e.g., blueprints, keys, posters).
- "Hall of Fame Award" worksheets (shaped like trophies, medals, or plaques).
- Craft supplies: gold and silver paper, glitter, markers, crayons.
- Upbeat, celebratory music (optional).

Teacher Preparation

- Prepare the "Hall of Fame" banner and the award templates.
- Display the students' previous work to create a gallery of their learning journey.
- The core of this lesson is celebration and reflection. The "Hall of Fame" metaphor provides a fun and high-status conclusion to the unit, allowing students to feel a sense of pride and accomplishment in their learning, and to honour the concepts and characters they have explored.

Additional Information

This lesson has been created as part of Donate Buddies, a program designed to help young children explore kindness, sharing, and the importance of helping others. By introducing these concepts in a fun, age-appropriate, and engaging way, children begin to understand the power of kindness and how their actions can make a big difference.

Organ, eye, and tissue donation is a real-life example of this kindness, where one person can help save the lives of many others. While most people can donate tissue, only a small number of people who pass away in hospitals can become organ donors. One organ donor alone can save up to seven lives and help many more people through eye and tissue donation.
